EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 6, 2020

WHEREAS, under Indiana Code § 36-3-3-2, the mayor of a consolidated city serves as the executive of both the consolidated city and the county;

WHEREAS, at a demonstration on May 29, 2020, hundreds of residents peacefully exercised their free-speech rights in protesting a history of systemic racism in our country;

WHEREAS, after the organized event concluded and night fell, a smaller group of individuals abandoned that advocacy positive change and turned to violence directed at law-enforcement officers, widespread property damage, setting fires, and looting;

WHEREAS, those actions resulted in injuries to law-enforcement officers and residents and widespread property damage;

WHEREAS, on May 30, 2020, a peaceful demonstration again devolved into riot, leading to multiple shootings, widespread property damage, fires, and looting;

WHEREAS, cities throughout the country have experienced similar nighttime civil disturbances in recent days and have, in an effort to prevent them, imposed nighttime curfews;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 10-14-3-1 provides that a riot or other public calamity requiring emergency action constitutes a disaster supporting the declaration of a disaster emergency;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29 grants me the authority to declare a local disaster emergency;

WHEREAS, I previously issued Executive Order No. 5, 2020—declaring a local disaster emergency in Marion County under Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic;

WHEREAS, that local disaster emergency remains in effect until at least June 8, 2020;

WHEREAS, Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29.5 grants me authority to declare a local travel emergency upon the declaration of a local disaster emergency;

WHEREAS, a warning-level local travel emergency means that travel may be restricted to emergency management workers only;

WHEREAS, under a travel warning, individuals are directed to:

- (A) refrain from all travel,
- (B) comply with necessary emergency measures,
- (C) cooperate with public officials and disaster services forces in executing any emergency operations plans, and
- (D) obey and comply with the lawful directions of properly identified officers;

WHEREAS, effective at 11:00 a.m. on May 31, 2020, the State of Indiana issued Executive Order 20-29, which rescinded the temporary preemption of local officials' authority to issue warning-level travel restrictions found in Executive Order 20-28;


THEREFORE, under the authority vested in me as Mayor of the Consolidated City of Indianapolis and Marion County and Chief Executive of Marion County by state law and local ordinance, **IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:**

1. I declare that, in addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, emergency conditions also exist in Marion County related to demonstrations that, though initially peaceful, have devolved into violent riots – particularly after nightfall.
2. Under Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29, Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29.5, and Section 201-5(a) of the Indianapolis Revised Code, I hereby declare a warning-level nighttime local travel emergency and a mandatory nighttime curfew (collectively, the "Curfew") that applies to all public streets and public places in Marion County as described below.
 - a. This Curfew will be in effect from 8:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 31 until 6:00 a.m. on Monday, June 1.
 - b. During the Curfew, no person may travel public streets or be in public places in Marion County unless subject to an exemption under Section 2(c) of this order.
 - i. The Curfew applies regardless of the method of travel on public streets or in public places, whether by automobile, motorcycle, bus, bicycle, scooter, foot, or other means of moving from place to place.

- ii. For purposes of this order, “public streets” and “public places” means any place, whether on privately or publicly owned property, accessible to the general public. This includes, but is not limited to, streets and roads, alleys, highways, driveways, sidewalks, parks, plazas, parking lots, and vacant lots.
- c. The following individuals are exempt from the Curfew:
- i. All law-enforcement, fire, and medical personnel;
 - ii. Members of the news media;
 - iii. Federal, state, or local public officials doing work deemed necessary by the public agency that employs them;
 - iv. Individuals traveling directly to or directly from work, seeking medical care, or fleeing from dangerous circumstances;
 - v. Individuals engaged in employment necessary to maintain a safe rail system, restore utility service, or provide other emergency public services;
 - vi. Individuals experiencing homelessness.
3. Under Indiana Code § 10-14-3-24 and Indiana Code § 10-14-3-34, violation of this Curfew order is a class B misdemeanor punishable by up to 180 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Further, under Indianapolis Revised Code § 103-3 and Indiana Code § 36-1-3-8(10), violations of this curfew order could also be subject to a civil sanction—a \$2,500 fine for a first offense and a \$10,000 fine for a second offense.
4. This order will be filed with the Marion County Clerk and the Clerk of the Indianapolis City-County Council in conformity with Indiana Code § 10-14-3-29(a). It will remain in effect through 6:00 a.m. on Monday, June 1 unless extended by further order.
